



Forever starts scholarship for home team

s a Rangerette in the mid-1970s, Cindy Trammell Wilson listened to director Gussie Nell Davis proclaim the *importance of giving back.*

Decades later, Wilson is putting the lesson into practice with a \$2,000 scholarship for a Rangerette who also hails from Wilson's high school team, the Friendswood Wranglerettes.

Wilson announced the scholarship this year at the Wranglerettes' spring show. She decided to create it a few days in advance. She headed to a print shop to have a plaque made, and the promise now hangs in the Wranglerette drill room.

Alyssa Falcone Goza, Wranglerette director, is a former Wranglerette herself and a 70th Line Forever. She took some of her students to Revels this year, where they met Rangerettes and took a master class.

"Our girls are so talented, and I would love to see some of my former students become a part of the next generation of Rangerettes!" Goza said. "This scholarship

will help immensely in making some girls' dreams come true!"

Wilson is handling the scholarship herself, and it is not affiliated with Kilgore College. Its recipient also will be eligible for the traditional KC scholarship, she pointed out. The Wranglerette scholarship has no academic requirements beyond the Rangerettes' scholastic standards; Wilson

emphasized that she wanted the money to help an "average girl" achieve her dream of being a Rangerette.

"I just think it's great to help out the Rangerettes," she said. "It's just dear to my heart. It was my dream from a child, and it's still a dream. I still get tears in my eyes when Rangerettes come up."

Most of all, it's about giving back, she said, and she encouraged others to follow suit.

"Any (Forever) could put \$2,000 aside a year to give to a girl if she wants to help build Rangerettes ... "Wilson said. "We could each do that to our home drill team ...

"We were given a gift, and we need to give back that gift." ★

The Rangerettes Forever organization is growing its relationship with the city, focusing on how Forevers return to Kilgore to stay in hotels, dine and otherwise spend money surrounding Rangerette events, Forever President Velma Yount said. She and Forever board member Pill Harmon Malm joined the tourism division of the Kilgore Chamber of Commerce, and they hosted a

lunch meeting to familiarize the chamber with Rangerettes Forever and members' economic impact in Kilgore.

"We believe they truly have a more informed perception of the Forever organization and what we bring to the area," Yount said.

Last year, Yount and Malm secured a \$1,500 chamber grant for Rangerette event promotion.

"It is nice we can work together to enhance all the area has to offer," Yount said. She and Malm plan to apply for the funding again this year, Yount said.

"(We) may or may not (get the grant), but at least they know we are a contributing factor to the financial success of the area," Yount said. ★

After a few days of vigorous practice and some exploring in Basel, the day of our first performance came. Now, when we sing "in rain or sunshine" in the fight song, I never thought I would really experience that — but this first show was exactly that. In the pouring rain, the show went on, and we performed the pom routine and the high





The show culminated with the Rangerette Extravaganza high kick performed in their traditional red, white and blue uniforms.



Like mother, like daughter

Rangerette directors instruct daughters in once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for organization

angerette directors Dana Blair and Shelley Wayne have been side-by-side for the last 25 years, leading the Rangerettes through football games, parades, international appearances and Revels performances. This year, the two add "Rangerette Mom" to their repertoire of shared experiences.

Alexa Blair, Dana's daughter, made last year's group as a member of the 77th Line.
Ryan Wayne, Shelley's daughter, joined as a freshman this year. The two have shared days

of dance recitals, sleepovers and childhood memories, but tonight they share the stage as teammates during the Rangerettes' two-hour variety show held each spring — Revels.

The two grew up understanding the Rangerettes were a strict, well-disciplined organization with world-wide fame. They knew of the team's long practice hours, in all kinds of weather. But Alexa, a former Longview High School Viewette captain and now a Rangerette line officer, was willing to commit.

"She was pretty nervous about trying out, but was absolutely willing to put in all the hard work and was not afraid of the discipline," Dana said.

Alexa, as a child following her mom around with a clipboard, embraced the experience.

"I have been around Rangerettes my entire life. I could not imagine starting my college career any other way," she said.

"I do feel like it is more challenging sometimes.

That there is a little more pressure on me to be good at everything, and I must earn and truly deserve everything I am rewarded," Alexa said.

"Even though (my mom) watches the whole team, she is also always watching me."

Ryan, a two-year captain for the Kilgore High School High-steppers, said she has wanted to be a Rangerette "since I was about 3 years old."


"I have always looked up to the Rangerettes, and I wanted to inspire others the same way they inspired me," Ryan said. Going to the head choreographer for advice has never been a problem for the life-long dancer.

"With my mom as my director my whole life, if I ever wanted extra help or guidance, she offered it to me," Ryan said. "As I got older, I went to her a lot more with dance needs. Now I just get even more guidance and help with dance, it's just in the form of a correction at practice."

Even though there are 72 women on the Rangerette line, working with their moms every day is still special.

"I love seeing my mom at practice because it feels like I never really left home," Alexa said. "Most people never get to

see their parents that often in college so I am very blessed by the situation."

Ryan enjoys working with her mom because, "we are very similar in how we think and how we both expect Rangerettes to operate. I can almost predict what she's going to say to us before she says anything."

And in the dorms, they're just like sisters — and just like their teammates.

"They understand the camaraderie of the team and they don't act any differently than the other girls," said

Shirley Arredondo, the Gussie Nell Davis Residence Hall house mother, who remembers them growing up in the organization. "They are just like the other young women who live here — amazing dancers, awesome young ladies." *
