Endowed scholarships pay out based on interest on the principal amount. When the market performs poorly, some scholarships cannot be awarded; even in better years, scholarships do not come close to covering all of a Rangerette's college expenses. In a typical



year, each scholarship pays out approximately 4% of the endowment: A scholarship with a \$17,500 principal pays about \$350 a semester. (Meanwhile, an academic year of 24 credit hours costs \$4,056 in tuition and fees for out-of-district Texas residents, according to the Kilgore College website. Add to that room and board, plus uniform and travel.)

The Hit-the-Hat campaign aims to boost principals to benefit Rangerettes at higher financial levels — and help preserve our legacy. Hundreds of companies will match employees' contributions, strengthening your gift. **Click here** for a list of companies that match.





WHAT'S A PERSONAL HABIT THAT HELPS YOU CONTINUE TO GROW AS A LEADER?


I am someone that works hard at anything I put my heart into. I believe that plays a big role in how I continue to work hard each day at practice in order for me to be the best leader that I can be for 823.

WHAT HAVE YOU LEARNED AS AN OFFICER THAT YOU THINK IS IMPORTANT FOR FUTURE


