

the woman I am now. It's a big answer.

When I was Rangerette, I was hyperfocused on never making a mistake during
a performance. I would literally practice
the material behind the scenes even right
up to the minute we would take the field
or the stage. The team would pray in a
big circle before each performance. After
the prayer, the girls would start casually
chatting and doing normal things, but
I would go off by myself and just keep
frantically practicing at high speeds.
During those minutes alone, I am not
sure what possessed me to say this prayer,
but I did: "God and Jesus who sits at the
right hand of the Father, please help me

to perform well and not make a mistake." He would faithfully answer that prayer, so the next performance, I would pray that exact prayer again — I prayed it for two years. What's interesting is that I didn't know who Jesus was at the time. I was just repeating words about Him that I heard somewhere. What's awesome (although not surprising) is that God heard my empty words repeated time and time again and in His timing brought me into a relationship with Him through His Son, Jesus. I now know there is power when you call on the name of Jesus. When I was a Rangerette, I thought I just needed His help getting through the performance, but God knew I needed Him in a much bigger way.

#### What is your grand, audacious goal?

My "goal" is to walk closely with the Lord all the days of my life. My hope is to raise God-fearing men who love their wives and children well. ★
